The OEO, through grant agreements with eligible subgrantees, will carry out the services and activities necessary to comply with Section 675(c)(1) of the Act. Establishment of program policies and operational procedures; 3. Development of accounting policies and procedures; 4. Development of fiscal procedures, including required audits; 5. Procedures for record maintenance and for supporting documentation; 6. Issuance of policies and procedures for compliance with Act 143 of 1983, South Carolina Code of Laws, referenced as the "Community Economic Opportunity Act of 1983", as amended; 7. Review and approval of subgrantee Community Action Plans; 8. Determination of subgrantee eligibility; 9. Issuance of grants; 10. Monitoring of the grant throughout the state; 11. Training and technical assistance; 12. Evaluation of subgrantee agency program performance and identification of remedial procedures; 13. Reporting of program data.
